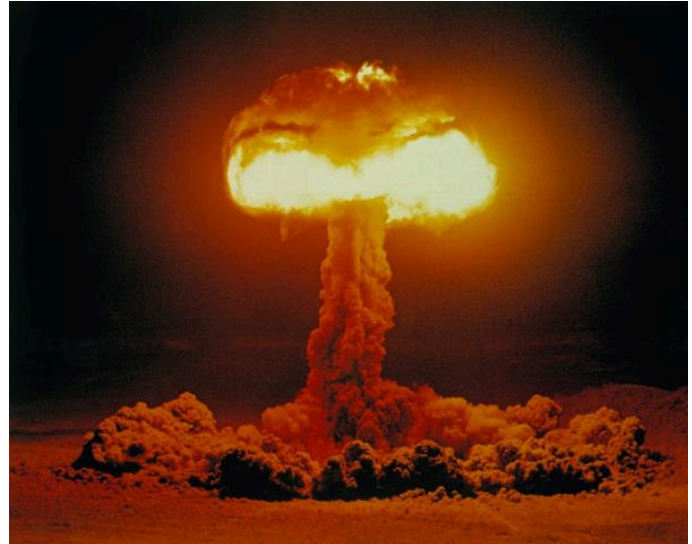




Trump tells Pentagon to resume testing US nuclear weapons

"Because of other countries testing programs, I have instructed the Department of War to start testing our Nuclear Weapons on an equal basis. That process will begin immediately," President Donald Trump posted on October 30.

The meaning of this announcement was immediately unclear- with the exception of North Korea in 2017, no nuclear power has conducted explosive nuclear testing in over 25 years. The United States last tested in 1992, China and France in 1996 and the Soviet Union in 1990. Post-Soviet Russia, which inherited the Soviet nuclear arsenal, has never done so.



Trump's announcement obviously took his administration by surprise. On Sunday, November 2, Secretary of Energy Chris Wright (The DOE is the department responsible for maintaining the US nuclear arsenal, not the "Department of War") contradicted the president when he indicated the United States has no intention of conducting new explosive tests, and would simply continue its regular testing of nuclear components and systems to ensure they are working properly. "These will be nonnuclear explosions. These are just developing sophisticated systems so that our replacement nuclear weapons are even better than the ones they were before," Mr. Wright told Fox News.

No, Trump responded, his Secretary of Energy is mistaken. "They test, and we don't test. We have to test." "Are you saying that after more than 30 years, the United States is going to start detonating nuclear weapons for testing?" Trump was asked by CBS news. "I'm saying that we're going to test nuclear weapons like other countries do, yes," Trump answered.

On November 3, the New York Times quoted Matthew Bunn, a Harvard professor focusing on nuclear weapons, who said it was "distressing when the guy with his finger on the button" does not appear to be in conversation with his own administration on this topic. "It makes everyone afraid when the guy in charge of America's nuclear weapons doesn't appear to know what he's talking about."

Russian President Putin's response that if the US resumes explosive nuclear tests, Russia will follow suit comes as no surprise.

The "regular testing of nuclear components and systems to ensure they are working properly," the sub-critical tests carried on regularly at the Nevada National Security Site is dangerous enough. These are part of a \$2 trillion program of "stockpile stewardship" and "life extension" of weapons that the US is obligated by treaty to eliminate. Weapons which, if they "work properly," will exterminate most of the life on our planet. Resumption of explosive nuclear testing in Nevada will greatly increase the risk of nuclear war.

Justice For Our Desert, 2025 Report



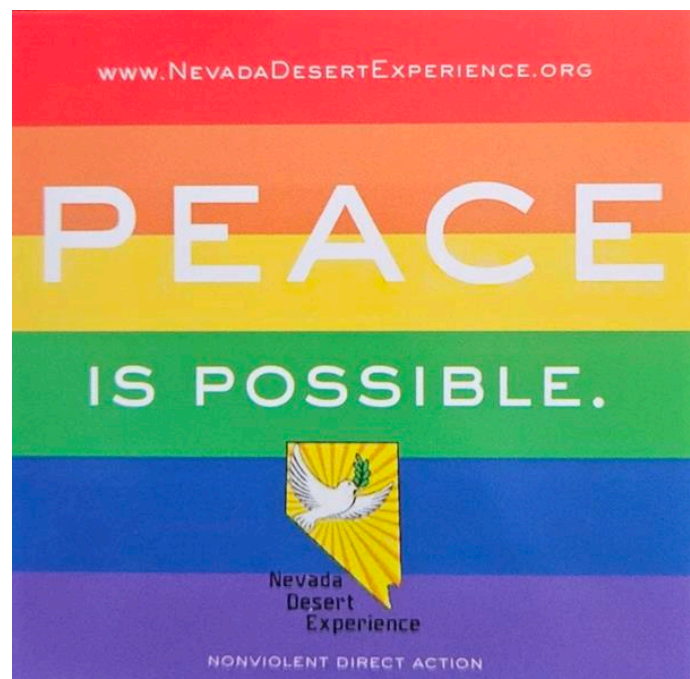
From Friday, October 10 to Monday, October 13, a small band of NDE activists convened in the desert for our annual event, Justice for our Desert.

From our base in Las Vegas, we visited oases at Spring Ranch near Las Vegas and the Goddess Temple at Cactus Springs. We joined the powwow at the Snow Mountain Paiute reservation, vigiled for peace at Creech Air Force Base and participated in a traditional sweat lodge. We watched the classic movie, Broken Treaty at Battle Mountain, followed by a discussion led by Jeremiah Jones of the Western Shoshone. [A short video review is posted on Youtube here.](#)

In his effort to reclaim Indigenous Peoples Day, the second Monday of October, for Christopher Columbus, President Trump issued a declaration, calling “upon the

people of the United States to observe this day with appropriate ceremonies and activities.” Protesting the nuclear test site operated by the US government on stolen Western Shoshone land was a most appropriate ceremony and activity to mark the day.
