Interview with August Desert Witness Speaker Ted Taylor:

Bomb Pioneer Critical of Subcritical Tests

by Keith Rogers, Las Vegas Review-Journal With its \$40 billion stockpile stewardship program, the United States is spiraling toward another Cold War that could produce small, fusion bombs without full-scale tests, a former nuclear weapons expert said.

Theodore Taylor, who designed some of the first atomic bombs tested at the Nevada Test Site and who was deputy technology director for the Defense Nuclear Agency in the mid-1960's, has, in his words, "done an about-face."

Instead of backing the government's Science-Based Stockpile Stewardship Program—a 10-year government project to assess reliability of the nation's aging nuclear arsenal— Taylor decries the program that will use high-tech lasers, computers and non-nuclear experiments to simulate nuclear explosions.

While plutonium might not

be the main ingredient in these smaller bombs, pure fusion — the joining of atoms to release large amounts of energy—could be accomplished using lithium and heavy hydrogen combined with techniques from these new experiments.

"It would open up a Pandora's box," he said in an interview last week following his arrest at the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory in California where he protested the lab's National Ignition Facility, a giant laser system, under construction, that is part of the \$10 billion program.

He said the bombs wouldn't be able to deliver the massive nuclear punch like the atomic bombs he once helped design, but they would be powerful enough to be used by terrorists to blow up a marketplace or building.

Taylor, 72, was the featured speaker at an anti-nuclear conference Saturday in Las Vegas at Christ Church Episcopal.

He was expected to carry his protest further today, joining others from the faith-based Nevada Desert Experience who intend to stage nonviolent, civil (continued on back page)

As I chatter with my escort


Attempting to pass this great joy to him



disobedience actions at the Mercury entrance to the test site, 65 miles northwest of Las Vegas. (Ted Taylor and 26 others were arrested trespassing onto the test site after an interfaith service.)

Subcritical nuclear experiments, in which high explosives are used to slam bits of plutonium in a detonation that stops short of a nuclear chain reaction, will give scientists an edge on new weapons development even though they are designed to assess aging of the stockpile, Taylor said.

"They are extremely informative even if they don't create lots of energy," he said.

Asked if full-scale tests, like those historically conducted at the test site, from 1951 to 1992, would still be required, Taylor said, "We're reaching a point, and have passed it, where those kinds of nuclear tests are no longer necessary" for weapons development.

Full-scale nuclear tests have been put on hold since the last test, Divider, on Sept. 23, 1992. But Taylor contends subcritical experiments like the one conducted below ground at the test site last month, and another planned for this month can damage the United States' reputation with other countries that view the experiments as leading to another arms race.

"The thing that disgusts me most, the country is preparing to violate a treaty signed by our president last September. Article I forbids any nuclear explosions of any kind, yet we're preparing to build the National Ignition Facility. The purpose is to make (nuclear) explosions that don't use plutonium or uranium at all," he said.

Asked what he meant when he said in 1995, "We were fascinated by abstract violence on a huge scale," Taylor, a former nuclear weaponeer at the Los Alamos, N.M., national laboratory, said he and probably other scientistswere

addicted to work on nuclear weapons.

He said he witnessed two nuclear tests in Nevada and three in the Pacific.

"It was my bomb and my idea, and the thrill of seeing something the size of the bomb that destroyed Hiroshima, it was a cause for celebrating," Taylor said.

"It's fair to say I bottomed out, admitting that I was hooked on a process that when carried through the end point was nothing but death, the death of most people in the world," he said.

"It was a full realization that I had been deceiving myself, and my mother and my wife. I had been working on this thing that would kill as many as possible," Taylor said, referring to his decision in 1966 that led to his prominence as an anti-nuclear activist.
